Meeting was graciously hosted by Clair & Pat Cunningham. Other members in attendance were: Jim Walker, Mike Bryant, Terry & Vanessa Monteith, Rick Hall, Lar-

ry Westfall, Mike Kaszuba & Michelle Braun, Paul Dragos, and Carol Serr.

BOTTLE SHOW 2023: Things started off with discussion as to if we will have a Bottle Show this year, and where. The Marriott has doubled their price since our last show there, so they are out of the question. Mike Bryant shared that the L.A. club wants us to join up with them, up there, to hold a show. How many of our club members would go to L.A. though? Especially if held in East L.A. While Larry doesn't think we should hold a show this year, since several big sellers have passed on, Rick suggested we take an anonymous poll of the members at our January meeting, to see if they want a show and if they will be selling or volunteering to help with one. Paul volunteered to send out the poll via email. Mike Kaszuba thinks Jim should send an email to all past sellers to see if they would come this year. Mike Bryan thinks we need to raise the price of the tables. Mike Bryant checked out the Lakeside rodeo grounds and thinks it is too small for our event. 

Poway man saves time in a bottle

POWAY — People across the country are crawling under buildings, sifting through old outhouse pits and diving to the sea floor looking for one thing: old bottles.

Why? Cecil Munsey of Poway knows.

"I'm collecting history," explains Munsey, who has written three books and numerous articles on collecting. "Eventually I write about everything I collect."


Embossings, labels and shape of bottle are among the characteristics that tell a lot about the hottles and the eras in which they were made. For example, companies used embossings, raised lettering and designs, so that other companies could not use their bottles. Labels come off, embossings do not.

Munsey's extensive bottle collection has everything from a reproduction of an original, nevermarketed Coca-Cola bottle to a bourbon bottle shaped like a pig. There's even an old bourbon bottle made by Old Quaker, a company that would one day be better known for its cereal-making under a different name the Quaker Oats Co.


Munsey started collecting bottles while teaching at Florence Elementary School in San Diego. Some of his students found and brought to class a few old glass bottles made in San Diego.

"The bottles were fascinating," Munsey recalled.

Munsey's bottles have a lot of stories behind them. One of his 7-Up bottles describes the soft drink as a "lithiated lemon soda," a polite way of telling customers it was good for hangovers. In the same cabinet, Munsey has a limited-edition



The last remaining copy of the first-known ad for Hire's Root Beer.




The maker of this bourbon is better known for its cereal.

Canada Dry bottle made in 1962 for Lyndon B. Johnson. The bottle has Johnson's name and the vice presidential symbol on it.

What began as a bottle collection has led to other collections, such as a variety of 1880s-era memorabilia used to sell Lydia Pinkham's Vegetable Compound, which supposedly cured "all female weaknesses," and trading cards for soda and other

such products. Companies used the trading cards as companies today use baseball cards are to advertise.

When Munsey isn't working as coordinator of child welfare for the San Diego County Office of Education or adding to his collections, he researches and writes about them. Munsey has written for *The Antiques Journal*, Old Bottle Magazine and The Antique Trader. He also is the author of three books: "Disneymania - Walt Disney Collectibles," "The Illustrated Guide to the Collectibles of Coca-Cola" and "The Illustrated Guide to Collecting Bottles," a textbook on the hobby.

Almost 30 years after he began his collection, Munsey continues to look under buildings, in barns, at antique shows — everywhere,

Time traveler tries to bring past to life

LEMON GROVE — Rurik Kallis follows the trail of lost bloodlines and antique castoffs searching from time to time.

This endless quest for the loose ends of history has drawn Kallis into darkened crawl spaces under abandoned, derelict houses, luring him on a paper chase that begins and ends in the dusty stacks of public libraries.

The passion has netted a colorful cache of 19th century photographs, milk bottles, ink bottles, soda bottles, tip trays — even a small, white porcelain cup to hold change for the ice man.

Sit down with Rurik Kallis in the quiet of his Victorian house — near the player piano where the cat sleeps — and ask him to weave a tale or two.

He smiles and begins with his own version of Tales from the Crypt.

The master sleuth stares into the dark amber shadows of a century-old wine bottle and recounts the strange story of baron John Long, dead these 60 years now and still waiting for a grave to call his own.

"Long was a legendary San Diego builder who lived a rollercoaster life and died a pauper," Kallis said, pacing across the polished wood floor in his airy living room.

When Long died in the early 1930s, his son, Ralph, purchased a crypt for him at the Los Angeles Abbey Mausoleum for \$200, but he never paid the bill.

"The cemetery put the old man in a holding vault and kept billing the son, who was generally regarded as a no-account, but he just ignored them."

When Ralph committed suicide by swallowing cyanide in a busy Robinson's department store in Los Angeles, there was no one left to pay for John Long's storage or to sign the proper forms for his removal. And so today, the once-powerful prince of commerce waits in a small receiving vault near Compton, while the bill for his storage rises steadily beyond his grasp.

Kallis pieced together Long's life story from newspaper clippings, property records, old photographs and the reminiscences of aging acquaintances who remembered the so-called baron, a builder and citrus grower who always appeared in public wearing a white shirt and tie.

The Long investigation was commissioned by John Parker when he bought one of the classic Victorians built by Long in San Diego's Old Town area.

But Kallis, 55, does most of his digging on his own time, often accompanied by his wife, Marjorie, and their 22-year-old son, Erik.

They sift the remains of aban-**

doned and demolished buildings and comb through the ravines and canyons that served as city dumps over a century ago.

And they come home laden with treasures that were tossed out as trash.

"You find something as simple as a perfume bottle, and when you take a close look, you see a story in there," Kallis said.

He picks up a small ink bottle — a palm-sized bit of pale blue glass dating to the 1890s — and lifts it up to the light.

"I remember we dug this up near Riverside, in a ravine that was used as a trash dump for a few large ranches.

"They're gone now," he said. "It's all gone, except for this little gem." And quick glints of blue light flash across his face.

He reaches for a large, opaque milk bottle made in 1912 and runs his fingers over the rippled symbol of the former Bonnie Brea Ranch in Bonita Valley.

"This is worthless as an antique, but it has historic value," Kallis said. "There was this wealthy ranch owner from Scotland who had a little dairy that bottled milk just for his employees and neighbors. He even had his own bottles made."

While Kallis goes about his life's work largely unnoticed, he found himself in the spotlight recently, when he set out to dig into the storied past of El Cajon.

The demolition by the city of a doughnut shop and restaurant at the historic corner of Main and Magnolia afforded a rare glimpse into the collective looking glass, or so Kallis thought.

Local archaeologists were afraid that in his zeal to salvage the delicate remains of the past, Kallis would mangle the site and destroy some valuable clues.

Kallis and his son had completed one test dig when city officials ordered him to stop the project. He can continue his work only when accompanied by a certified archaeologist.


The corner lot at Main and Magnolia is the former site of the historic Corona Hotel, the 1886 landmark stop for tourists traveling west on U.S. Highway 80.

Six feet below the ruptured asphalt surface, Kallis unearthed a patent medicine bottle produced in the 1890s in New Brunswick, Canada. Using a post-hole digger, he found brass spoons from the Hotel Corona and shards of china dinner plates from England.

"It's like having a few pieces of a puzzle and trying to imagine the rest of the picture," Kallis said, peering down at a small brass spoon in his right palm.




