

PROGRAM


The program was on Jim Livingstone's bottles from the historic ghost town of Bodie, CA. He had given a similar program back in 2015 at our February meeting. He had more bottles and other Bodie items to share tonight. The town of Bodie is the largest and best preserved ghost town in the U.S. It began in the early 1870s and the population "boomed" after a rich vein of ore was uncovered due to a mine cave-in in 1875. The population grew to 10,000 at one point, but then dropped to only 500 by 1900. Ninety percent of the town burned down in a 1932 fire. But there are still 200 some buildings in the town, owned by the State Park system since 1964 and kept in a state of "arrested decay." Jim fell in love with the town, and after seeing a book on bottles by John Chapman in our Club library years ago, he needed to get a Bodie bottle. The rest is history, as they say. Jim shared his pharmacy, beer, brandy, and seltzer bottles from Bodie.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 PM.

“What is the fascination with collecting old bottles?” That is a question I get asked a lot when people find out I belong to an antique bottle club. Others may not find this interesting, but it is the fascination that fuels my collecting, the stories that bottle could tell. I wish they could talk.

F.W. BRADLEY



This is a story about the life of F.W. Bradley , a beloved son, a Civil war soldier, a entrepreneur, and a family man who loved his beloved state of California . He had many accomplishments throughout his storied life but he will be forever etched in the annals of history as a purveyor of wine, liquors, bottled soda and mineral water. His name is literally embossed on glass bottles for people to admire, collect and inquire about the history of his life . Francis William Bradley was born in Audrain County, Missouri on May 1848. Francis grew up being raised only by his father as his Mother passed away when he was young. Francis grew up as any normal young man at that time helping his father with needed chores around the home. As soon as Francis was able, he joined the Union Army in his mid-teens .In August 1864, Bradley enlisted as a private in Company A of the 44th Regiment of Missouri Infantry according to government records. Only after one month after his training he saw combat. Francis was involved in many fierce battles and was hospitalized for a period of time in 1864. He was later discharged for a described disability. The disability he had did not however affect his ability to earn a living. After the war he married and moved to St. Joseph Missouri. Around 1887 the Bradley's moved to San Diego. There Francis initially opened a saloon with a partner called the Eintracht Saloon at 963 Fifth Street in San Diego. A subsequent owner would call it a "resort." The saloon featured a hot lunch available before noon, cold steam and lager beer, and mixed drinks — not just shots of rotgut whiskey at the bar. After he sold the saloon he ran the Albemarle Hotel. After leaving the hotel job Francis founded two businesses, the Bradley Spring Water and Bottling Company, located at 1225 C Street, and F.W. Bradley Wholesale Wines and Liquors, located at 1058-1062 Fourth Avenue

Throughout his career as a San Diego whiskey merchant, Bradley advertised his goods vigorously. Showing a cartoonish figure straddling a rail, one ad asserted: *““ On the Fence as to where to ensure the best wines and liquors of all kinds? Don't poison yourself by drinking inferior liquors when you can buy the pure goods at a very little more cost. We have all the favorite brands. Buy here and you are sure of the quality as well as quantity .Try our Eastern Peach or Apple Brandy.”* F. W. Bradley –Wholesale Wines and Liquors. Bradley's flagship brand was "Good Roads," a blended whiskey. He was issued a trademark for the name in February 1910.

At the same time, the proprietor's spring water and bottling plant were flourishing. Francis claimed to be sole owner of what he called "the Celebrated Bradley Spring" near San Diego. His ads touted his bottled spring water as "a pure natural mineral water, efficacious in all kind of kidney and stomach problems." His company also sold a full line of carbonated soft drinks, including root beer, ginger ale and flavored soda waters. Bradley bottled his non-alcoholic beverages in Hutchinson type bottles. Those hutch bottles also carried his embossed name. These hutch bottles bearing his name are prized processions of bottle collectors not only in California, but across the nation.

Francis Bradley lived a full and rich life with it however ending abruptly. Only two years after receiving a trademark patent on his famous "Good Roads" blended whiskey he loved, he succumbed to a heart attack in San Diego on May 3, 1912. He was 66 years old. His funeral was held at the chapel of a local funeral home. Francis Bradley was buried San Diego's Mount Hope Cemetery.



The Story Behind: The LBJ ACL



Lyndon Baines Johnson was born on August 27, 1908 in the small rural Texas community of Stonewall. He was the oldest of five children, and got the political bug at an early age when he was elected President of his 11th grade class. In 1926 he enrolled in Southwest Texas State Teacher's College

(today's Texas State University.) He graduated in 1930 and briefly taught public speaking and debate in a couple local high schools.

Johnson's father Samuel was a well respected politician who served six terms in the Texas legislature. It was no surprise that Lyndon would become active in local politics. His tenacity and hard nosed work ethic was legendary and it wasn't long before he was appointed as a legislative secretary to Texas Congressman Richard Kleberg. In 1937, Johnson saw his chance and ran for Congress. It was a hard fought race, but he won and would serve for 12 years. In 1949 he was elected Senator. He would become one of the most powerful men in the U.S. Senate.



In 1960, Johnson was persuaded to run for the office of President of the United States on the Democratic Ticket. His opponent was a very popular John Kennedy. Kennedy would win the party's nomination. Knowing he would have


a hard time being elected President without the help of Southern Democrats, Kennedy asked Johnson to be his Vice Presidential



running mate. The 1960 race pitted Kennedy and Johnson, against Richard Nixon for President and Henry Cabot Lodge for Vice President. It was a close race, but John F. Kennedy would become the 35th President, and Johnson the 36th Vice President of the United States.

It was well known that while relaxing on his ranch, Vice-President Johnson's favorite drink of choice was scotch and soda. Cutty Sark and Canada Dry Club Soda to be exact. This fact did not go unnoticed by W.D. Matthews, the owner

of the Canada Dry Bottling Company of San Antonio, Texas. Vice President Johnson was to be the keynote speaker at the American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages national convention to be held in Dallas towards the end of November 1963. Matthews thought it would be nice to thank Johnson by producing a special applied color labeled (ACL) club soda bottle honoring the Vice President. One hundred cases, totaling 2400 bottles were produced. They were a big hit with Johnson, and he started using them at his ranch upon arrival. It is noted that not all of the bottles may have made it to the ranch. There is speculation that many were taken as souvenirs by the bottling plant employees. Still, only 2400 were produced, so that is a relatively small number by today's standards.



In preparation for re-election for a second term as President, Kennedy planned to make campaign swings through several key states. One of those states was Texas. On November 22, 1963 he landed in San Antonio for a two day, five city tour of Texas. Vice President Johnson had planned a big shindig at his ranch to honor the President's visit. No doubt, the special LBJ ACL would have been prominently on display and served to the dignitaries in attendance.

What would happen that day in Dallas, changed everything. The world was in shock. One moment Johnson was planning a big party, the next he was on Air Force One being sworn in as the 36th President of the United States. Needless to say, the BBQ that was to honor President Kennedy never happened.



So what became of all the special Johnson sodas? Most were used at the ranch or given away. A couple phone company employees claim that they were given permission to dig the dump on the ranch where they recovered several of the bottles.

I was fortunate to add one to my collection years ago. From time to time one will appear on Ebay, but be prepared to spend several hundred dollars if you want to land one of these much sought after ACL's.
