Fragments of only 21 bottles were recovered by archaeological excavations in this dump in the 1970s (stored at SDSU). The meeting adjourned at 8:40pm.

Our travels this summer brought us to the town of Shipshewana, Indiana. Here is located one of the largest Amish & Mennonite communities in the United States. It is also home to one of the largest outdoor antique flea markets in the U.S. Over 1000 vendors set up to sell on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from May to October. Included in the 100 acre flea market site are huge barns where antique auctions run all day long. Did You Know (do you care) By Mike Bryant

Did you know that over six hundred years ago the outhouse as we know it originated in Europe during the fifteenth century? Sleeping establishments such as fine inns, began offering "His" and "Her's" outhouses. Most people then were illiterate so symbols were used on the outhouse to show which was his and which was hers. Pictures of the sun were used on the doors for men because the sun was a symbol for masculinity, and the moon for women because it meant femininity. As time went by, innkeepers reasoned that maintaining a men's outhouse was unnecessary because men could always go outside into the woods. Those who couldn't or wouldn't could use the women's outhouse. Gradually, men's outhouses disappeared, leaving only women's outhouses, marked with the crescent moon.


In Canada, the outhouse is called a "backhouse," in Australia, a "dunny" or "thunderbox."

In 1591 Sir John Harrington made the first flushing lavatory for his Godmother, Queen Elizabeth I. He would go on to write a joke book of questionable taste about his invention, and in America, in his honor, his contraption would be forever known as the "John."

In 1872 Englishmen Thomas Crapper a plumber, refined the flush toilet and held five patents on it. During World War I, American doughboys passing through England would see the name "T. Crapper" on the toilet tanks, so it was only a matter of time before the saying "I am going into the Crapper to take a c#@p" was first uttered. Now you know...


There has been some debate in the club whether the olive green bottle with "CARLSBAD LS" embossed on the bottom is from Carlsbad, California or not. After extensive research, two trips to the Carlsbad Historical Society's museum and a visit to Balboa Park to the House Of Germany and House of Czechoslovakia, I can now say, it is not from our Carlsbad. Instead, it was imported from Czechoslovakia, and distributed to American companies who put their own labels on the bottles. The story behind the water is very interesting though. The area of Czechoslovakia where the famous spas are located and mineral water bottled is named Karlovy Vary. This area has been the home to a large group of ethnic Germans for centuries who call the area Karlsbad. In English, the K is changed to a C, thus Karlsbad becomes Carlsbad, and you will see both used interchangeably. What does the "LS" embossed on the bottom stand for? It is the initials of the German exporter, "LÖBEL SCHOTTLÄNDER."

What about our Carlsbad? Well, they indeed bottled water and the large picnic sized clear bottle is clearly labeled as being from Carlsbad, California. There is a nice example of the bottle in the historical society museum in Carlsbad located at 258 Beech Ave.




