

DID YOU KNOW?



IF BOTTLES COULD TALK: THE FORGOTTEN PHARMACY OF THE HOTEL BALDWIN



Philadelphia Inquirer – June 23, 1912

My obsession with antique bottles began in my early teens. My main focus is quackery and medicine bottles manufactured in the 1800s through the early 1900s. My fascination with the history of weird remedies, medicine, and medical treatments is something I grew up with. My mother, Maria, was a nurse and these were topics we enjoyed and discussed frequently. My first job was at Rite Aid Pharmacy where, among other things, I helped in the pharmacy and learned about modern medications. I usually acquired my bottles by digging, antique fairs, thrift stores, and yard sales. Researching and collecting local bottles became one of my passions.



In 2017, I was contacted by a friend to see if I was interested in some old bottles she had. At the time, she was the owner of a small consignment shop, and sometimes received bottles from commercial fisherman who would occasionally bring them up with their catch in trawling nets. When I arrived, she showed me some of their finds: 1880s blob top soda bottles, milk bottles, glass bottle stoppers, and other interesting trinkets. Then, she showed me a small clear glass medicine bottle; I almost fainted. There, embossed on this small antique glass bottle were the words "Durand" and "BEACH HAVEN, NJ." Realizing the rarity of what I was holding, my hands began to tremble. Knowing that I am an avid collector of old bottles and that I might be able to find out more about this rare treasure, my

that I might be able to find out more about this rare treasure, my friend was willing to part with it. I immediately began researching. Similar bottles with the same name had been found in Moorestown, New Jer-

sey. The Moorestown Historical Society states that Durand was a medical product manufacturing company, but from my years of bottle collecting experience, I knew the name on the bottle had to be the pharmacist not the bottle maker.

After years of searching with few to no leads, an antique postcard I found at auction brought a ray of hope. The postcard featured the side of the Hotel Baldwin and on

the ground floor I could see a drug store. There it was — Durand's Pharmacy!

After further research I concluded the pharmacy would have been located on the corner of Beach Avenue and Pearl Street in Beach Haven and was part of the west end of the famous and long-gone Hotel Baldwin. Unfortunately, there was no date associated with the postcard, so, I turned my research back to the origins of the bottle.

Most pharmacy bottles of a similar time period were made by a handful of glass manufacturers. Generally, the name of the pharmacist/proprietor was embossed on the bottle in script above the city where the pharmacy was located. The curved front of the bottle was left blank to allow for a paper label with the patient's name and doctor's instructions to be affixed to the surface.

My Durand's bottle is a standard size clear glass prescription vile, usually intended for syrups/liquid medicines. It is embossed with only the name of the pharmacy. I could tell by the shape of the neck that the bottle was made sometime between 1890 and 1920, as after that the use of corks and stoppers were generally discontinued, and manufacturers switched almost exclusively to twist-off caps. The bottom of the bottle gave another clue, the letter B above a U.S.A. mark. I knew this was one of the trademarks used by the Whitall Tatum Glass Company.

Whitall Tatum was a glass company founded in 1806 in Millville, New Jersey. They manufactured many prescription and laboratory bottles for druggists along the east coast and held several different patent designs for medicine bottles. After researching further, I was able to pinpoint the year my bottle had been manufactured: 1912. This would later coincide with more information about the druggist himself, Arthur J. Durand. Answer A

A.J. Durand, as he was known around Beach Haven, was a popular man. Originally from Pennsylvania, he eventually settled in Tuckerton, New Jersey. Along with Beach Haven, Durand would go on to open pharmacies in Tuckerton, and Moorestown, New Jersey. Durand's pharmacy in Beach Haven was part of the Hotel Baldwin and was in direct competition with the original Engleside Hotel's pharmacy, Paxson's, run by L.C. Paxson. As time went on Durand's pharmacy grew and could be seen in advertisements promoting Beach Haven to Island visitors. Along with prescriptions, customers could purchase ice cream, soda, and other seasonal items in his beachside pharmaA. J. Durand enjoyed Island life. An avid sailor, he joined the newly formed Little Egg Harbor Yacht Club in 1912 and was eventually elected as their first fleet surgeon. Durand was close friends with the original Buckalews and served as best man at their daughter's wedding in 1906. He also joined them on rabbit and quail hunts. Along with hunting, Durand enjoyed fishing, and often reported on the fish he saw in the waters around Beach Haven. Though no date is available for when Durand stopped operating his businesses, it is known that he eventually retired to a life of fishing and frolicking, leaving his pharmacies to new owners. cy. In retrospect, it is amazing that a small glass bottle scooped up by chance in trawling nets far from the shores of LBI became the thread that led to the rediscovery of the location of Durand's Pharmacy in Beach Haven. If the nets had missed this one small bottle this history would remain beneath the waves.



BLAST FROM THE PAST

Joseph Toigo November 1993

Place: a small stucco house in Old Town, San Diego - Year: Bicentennial year, 1976 by Joseph Toigo

It was in the early Spring of 1976 during a hard rainfall that my wife, who had been outside to check the rainfall and drainage in the yard, came into the house with news that we had a problem. I asked her apprehensively what it might be, knowing from the tone of her voice that it was not good news. She only said to go outside and look at the back corner of the house by the bedroom. So I did, not knowing what to expect and as I turned the corner, there, directly under the bedroom window, which faces the Connors property, was a huge hole about four feet deep and as wide. The rain damage had exposed the bottom of the concrete foundation and water had run under the house, forming a small pond.


I had known before I bought the property from Mrs. Frank Connors back in 1946, that an old well had stood on or near this spot but I had been assured that it had been filled in properly. Now looking at the damage, I realized that it had not been filled solid and after all these years had finally settled. About this time the rain had subsided but it looked like another storm was on its way. Knowing that if something was not done immediately, another storm would damage the house extensively.

I went to the nearest supply store and loaded the car with ready-mix concrete and asphalt, came home, grabbed a shovel and sledge hammer and proceeded to break up the sidewalk so I could start digging out all the loose dirt and mud. It was then that I started coming up with an odd assortment of articles, an old compact with a broken mirror, a half pint whiskey bottle with the Quaker logo, an old pick axe and hoe, both minus handles, a broken plaster lamp which had been in the shape of a dog, and all kinds of bric-a-brac that usually are thrown away especially in a spot like this.

I was getting a strong urge to start sifting each shovelful of dirt but I knew time would not allow it. But on the next shovelful, there was an odd shape chunk of dirt which I could not resist picking up and examining. After cleaning off the dirt, it seemed like a badge, so I washed it in water and appearing on the face were the words, "City of San Diego Police" and a number "76". I put this in my pocket and proceeded to dig. Soon I came up with a small star like those that are worn on the lapel or shoulder of a policeman's blouse. Putting this in my pocket and now trying to overcome a desire to keep looking, I again started digging hoping to reach a solid footing.

One hour later, I found the second badge, a seven point star with "Police #6 San Diego" on the face and the clasp on the back side was still intact. I put this in my pocket also, then started digging harder and faster

ignoring all and any other fragments that came up with each swing of the shovel. Finally reaching what seemed to be fairly sound footing, I started to fill the hole with the pieces of broken concrete from the sidewalk and with all the rock I could scavenge around the yard. I filled that hole with rock from baseball size to some that weighed 30 pounds or so. After I had dumped in enough to come up to the foundation, I then proceeded to pour in the ready-mix cement. After some time the concrete had set but a few drops of rain were falling so I would not be able to wait for the cement to dry. I took the asphalt and spread it over the top of the cement. I tapped it down and shaped it like a trough to make a quick water drain-off. It started to rain just as I was finishing the last few feet. I stood and watched the rain for a while, very satisfied with the way the water was draining and fast enough to not penetrate the area I had just worked on.

I then went into the house to clean up, and thinking about those badges I thought of Emma Connors, whose husband Frank Connors had been a policeman and also his father Paul before him. Thinking the badges may have belonged to Frank or Paul, I paid a visit next door to Emma Connors.

Mrs. Connors was surprised to see the badges and told me her husband, Frank, was a policeman and that he was a member of the first bicycle patrol and also that she still had Frank's badge which she showed to me. She had absolutely no knowledge of the two I had found. Emma also said that the hole

had been filled in the late 20's and maybe her son Bill might remember or know how or where the badges came from.

Thinking to myself that Bill at the time was around 12 years old he may have been playing cops & robbers and lost the badges at that spot. But that idea was eliminated after speaking to Bill Connors.



William E. Connors -- 1889. Born 1859. Joined San Diego Police force at 30 years of age, June 1st, 1889. Left the force August 1st, 1889. Wore Badge #6. He went to Whitier Reform School and served as a guard until his retirement.

He did not remember or recognize the badges or give me any appreciable answer. Getting back to my house, I put the badges away and decided not to say anything about the incident because at this time quite a few people with metal detectors were around the Old Town area and I was concerned about the corner foundation of the house and didn't want anyone digging around the area.

Well, about six months went by and one day I asked my wife, Carmen, if she would care to take a drive with me to the Police Station. Carmen said, "Not necessarily, what for?" I said I wanted to get some information on the badges. She agreed to go with me and we proceeded to the San Diego Police Department on Harbor Drive. Arriving at the station in mid-afternoon, we went in and introduced ourselves to the officer in charge. The officer was very cordial and proceeded to show us all the photos they had, also giving us a tour of the station, at the same explaining that all the early police records had been removed from the basement and were in the possession of Sgt. Kinney, who was convalescing from a heart attack and had all the records in his home. We left the station with Sgt. Kinney's address and at this time knowing only that badge '76' was used about 1912 and the seven point '6' before 1900.

- > We went to Sgt. Kinney's home who at the time was out for a walk. We waited about ten minutes until he arrived; after introducing ourselves Sgt. Kinney invited us in. I showed him the badges in which he showed a great deal of interest and mentioned that he would like to have them for his collection. I said I was not ready to release them at this time but I would appreciate any information he could give me. Looking through the record books he could find nothing on badge '76', but he said he did not have all of the records. On the seven point star he found that two men had worn the badge. First, George H. Knowles had worn the badge as early as 1885, then William E. Connors, born 1859, who joined the police force at age 30, June 1st, 1889, had also worn badge '6'. He left the force August 1, 1889.

After talking to Mrs. Emma Connors and her son William, also Lottie Mustain, none could explain how the badges showed up in that spot. Could the Badge '76' have belonged to Paul Connors, who was San Diego's first bailiff?

Could William Connors, after leaving the police force, have visited his kin folks in Old Town, discarded the badge while there and gone on his way? The mystery remains.

There also is a photograph of George Pringle wearing badge '6' dated the 1890's.. is this a new badge or the same one?

This trio of typical tintype characters will probably go down in history as the fathers of modern law and order in San Diego. (Pictured in front of the Insurance and Trust Company.) Lopez, one of the 30 men who made up San Diego's first organized police force, was a grandson of the early settler who built Casa de Lopez, ruins of which still may be seen in Old Town (Carlos Murphy's Restaurant on Twiggs St). Lopez served on the police force for 26 years and is especially remembered for his part in organizing the mounted division.

Chief Gonzales, a Mexican, was the very first law officer in San Diego, long before the turn of the century. In 1910, when this picture was taken, the Chief was 101 years old.

Paul Connors, the son of '49'er J.W. Connors, was San Diego's first court bailiff and held the position for many years. Born in 1870, he served first as a patrolman to Bailiff from 1909 to 1928. Connors died of a heart attack in 1928 while driving his 'Nash' at 30th and 'A' Street. Services were held at the historic Immaculate Conception Church in Old Town.
